## **Safety Smarts: The Importance** of Rapid Distribution of ID Info

A common misperception is that every missing person case involves an AMBER Alert, but by design few actually do. SafeAssured IDs provide families and law enforcement the ability to quickly disperse comprehensive information in every type of case. The following is a brief history of how the AMBER Alert program began and the type of cases it's used for.

The program originated in the state of Texas, as a legacy to 9-year-old Amber Hagerman, whose life tragically ended

in 1996. While riding her bike in Arlington, Texas, Amber was kidnapped and then brutally murdered. The community learned after the horrific event that local law enforcement officials had information that might have assisted in prompt location efforts, however they were incapable of distributing the information. In response, Dallas-Fort Worth broadcasters partnered with local police to create a warning system to assist in the search of abducted children.
